Key achievements to date until July 2021:

- School Games Mark Gold Status 2016/2017 2018/2019. It has been on hold due to COVID-19.
- The school has benefitted from being part of the NWLSSP. We continue to benefit from CPD during school closure
- The impact of COVID restrictions have brought significant challenges. At the start of term, the children came into school with noticeably lower fitness and activity levels and in many cases a lack of resilience. Children have had an additional afternoon break - another chance for them to be active.
- Mile a day 'footprints' installed on the playground to further encourage physical activity
- We have offered Multi-Sports to every year group during the Summer term, including EYFS.
- In school competitions increased- there is a high standard of PE teaching across the school
- All classes have taken part in the Forest School Programme this year. Through the sessions the children are encouraged to develop self-confidence and self-esteem through hands on learning experiences using natural materials. Increased forest school opportunities for all children since school reopening in March
- Wake and shake takes place in KS1, this now includes dough disco and squiggles while you wiggle, active English sessions
- The PE curriculum has been reviewed and a progression map is in place to ensure progression in skill and knowledge through the school
- Weekly CPD is delivered to our staff by our sports coach to ensure that staff have the skills to deliver all areas of the PE curriculum. Sports coach used to deliver additional 1/2 day PE, teacher/support staff observe to develop own skills

Areas for further improvement

- Increase involvement in external competitions and events- use of virtual competitions if necessary- Covid restrictions permitting
- Roll out wake and shake across the school to increase daily participation in sport - PE lead to create resources for staff to access
- Develop daily sporting activities at lunchtime linked to curriculum teaching of sports to allow children access to sports resources/equipment
- Provide further opportunities for children to engage in physical activity during play/lunchtimes
