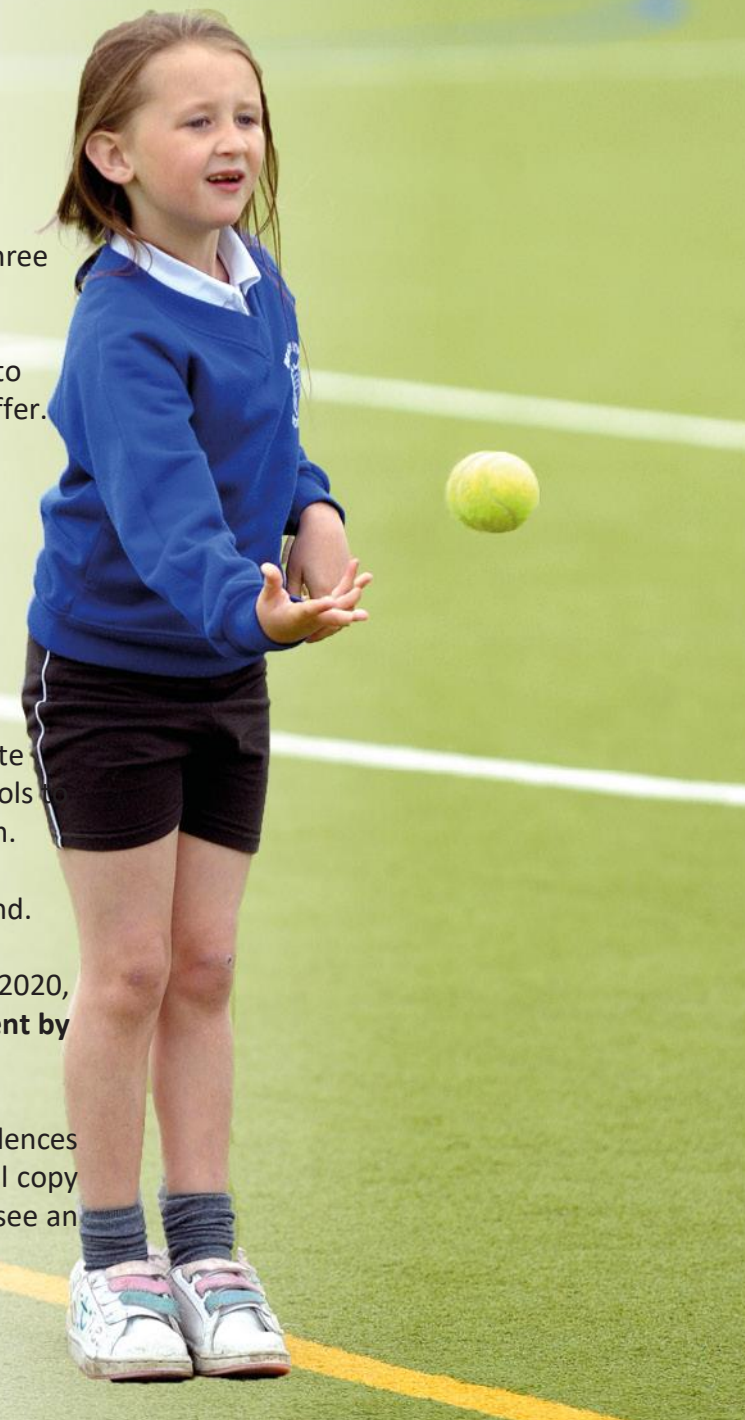

Key achievements to date until July 2022:	Areas for further improvement
<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • School Games Mark - Gold Status - 2016/2017 - 2018/2019. It has been on hold due to COVID-19 hoping to regain Gold for 2021/2022 • The school has benefitted from being part of the NWLSSP. • The impact of COVID restrictions have brought significant challenges. At the start of the year, the children came into school with noticeably lower fitness and activity levels and in many cases a lack of resilience. Children have had an additional afternoon break - another chance for them to be active. • Mile a day 'footprints' installed on the playground to further encourage physical activity, development of additional grassed areas for physical activity, using field and outside space at every opportunity. • We have offered additional sport after school to every year group including EYFS. • In school competitions increased- there is a high standard of PE teaching across the school • All classes have taken part in the Forest School Programme this year. Through the sessions the children are encouraged to develop self-confidence and self-esteem through hands on learning experiences using natural materials • Wake and shake takes place in KS1, this now includes dough disco and squiggles while you wiggle, active English sessions • The PE curriculum has been reviewed and a progression map is in place to ensure progression in skill and knowledge through the school • Weekly CPD is delivered to our staff by our sports coach to ensure that staff have the skills to deliver all areas of the PE curriculum. <i>Sports coach used to deliver additional 1/2 day PE, teacher/support staff observe to develop own skills</i> • Additional gross motor skills sessions for pupils identified by staff- purchased resources to support these sessions 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Increase involvement in external competitions and events- • Develop daily sporting activities at lunchtime linked to curriculum teaching of sports to allow children access to sports resources/equipment • Provide further opportunities for children to engage in physical activity during play/lunchtimes • Continue gross motor skills sessions for pupils identified by staff
